### Appointment of a design team for a new Library in Clonmel

phases of the new Library for Clonmel. Tipperary County Council have that ABK will deliver a transformational project." appointed ABK as the lead architect for the proposed new Library in Clonmel on the current site in Mick Delahunty Square.

Founded in 1961, ABK Architects is a design-led practice with an international reputation for the delivery of buildings of the highest quality. Renowned for its work in many fields including housing, education, healthcare, office and work-space as well as public buildings and the arts, imaginative approach has led to a succession of acclaimed the practice's buildings. Recent projects include Kilmallock Library and Area Office, Roscommon County Council's Civic Offices and the Library Building for Munster Technological University.

The current Library in Clonmel has served the citizens of Tipperary very well for nearly four decades and is the busiest Library in Co. Tipperary with over 100,000 visitors every year. However, the design and layout of the building now presents a number of challenges and the current Library no longer has the capacity to fully meet customer's needs. The new Library will be a transformational Library which will be built on the current site in Mick Delahunty Square. The new Library will be built over 2 floors possibly extending to 3 floors. It will be a high-quality building which will be flexible

and adaptable. This will allow the new Library to be a cultural and social inclusion hub, playing a pivotal role in strengthening community identity and promoting civic participation.

The Mayor of Clonmel Borough District, Cllr Pat English said "The appointment of a design team for a new Library in Clonmel is a very positive step for the town. We are proud of the strong tradition of our Library Service in Clonmel. I am delighted that such a transformational building is a step closer and I very much welcome the fact that the new Library will remain on the current site in the town".

The Cathaoirleach of Tipperary County Council, Roger Kennedy said "It is a day of pride to see such a positive development for Clonmel. Every **District** community deserves a quality public library service and every member of the community is entitled to access to these services. I believe this appointment again demonstrates Tipperary County Council's commitment to providing the best possible public services for our citizens."

Tipperary Children and Young People's Services Committee launched its second *Children and Young People's Plan*, 2022-2025, on 11<sup>th</sup> October in the Anner Hotel, Thurles. The launch was chaired by Anne Marie Stafford, Area Manager Tusla, Carlow/Kilkenny/South Tipperary.

The Children and Young People's Plan provides a profile on the children and the young people in the county, drawing on key statistics relating to health, education and economic circumstances, and on responses to consultations carried out with children and young people, with parents and with front-line staff. Key issues targeted in the Children and Young People's plan include mental health and wellbeing from infancy; parent support tailored to meet different levels of family need; access to education and to the labour market for travellers; youth spaces; and the range of needs of children and young people with additional needs and their families. ### Parents urged not to gift quad bikes or scramblers as presents for children this Christmas









38%\* of those injured in incidents involving quad bikes or scramblers were aged 18 or under (2017-2021)

#### Road Safety Authority and An Garda Síochána renew public safety messaging

38%\* of those injured in incidents involving quad bikes or scramblers, in the period 2017 to 2021, were aged 18 or under, according to provisional statistics released by the Road Safety Authority (RSA).

The RSA, An Garda Síochána and Mr Keith Synnott, Consultant at the National Spinal Injuries Unit in the Mater Hospital, have renewed their public safety message that quad bikes and scramblers pose a safety risk to children and are urging parents not to gift them this Christmas.

Casualty figures show that between 2017 and 2021, 88\* people were injured in collisions involving a quadbike or scrambler on a public road. In the same period there were four\* fatalities involving quad bikes or scramblers on public roads.

In line with a commitment in the Programme for Government, the Road Traffic and Roads Bill 2021 contains several measures to deal with the anti-social use of scramblers, quad bikes, and other machines. The Bill, which is currently before the Seanad, will allow prosecution for dangerous driving on all terrain rather than just a public place, will allow regulations to be made prohibiting certain classes of vehicles from certain classes of places, and creates new Garda powers of seizure of the vehicles, including at the place where they are kept."

The provisional findings published today examine fatal and injury collisions that occurred from 2017 to 2021. These collisions occurred on public roads, were reported to An Garda Síochána and involved a vehicle specified as being a quad bike or scrambler.





### Minister Naughton Announces fines for 16 road safety offences to double from October 27

Fine for speeding to double to  $\in$ 160. Fines for non-wearing of seatbelts and mobile phone use to double to  $\in$ 120 Fines for Learner drivers found driving unaccompanied to double to  $\in$ 180. Fines for non-display of `L' and `N' plates to double to  $\in$ 120

Three new Fixed Charge Offences will be introduced in new year **Tackling speeding** the theme of Road Safety Authority Annual Conference

**26 October 2022**: Minister of State at the Department of Transport, Ms. Hildegarde Naughton announced that the <u>fines relating to 16 road safety offences</u> will double on 27 October, 2022. Minister Naughton made the announcement at the Road Safety Authority's Annual Conference in Croke Park today. The theme of the conference is **Tackling Speeding – Risk Factors and Interventions**.

From the 27 October some of the <u>fines</u> that are doubling include speeding (from €80 to €160), mobile phone use (€60 to €120), non-wearing of seatbelts (€60 to €120), and failing to ensure that a child is properly restrained (€60 to €120).

Certain fines relating to safety offences committed by learner and novice drivers, are also increasing. The fine for a learner permit holder driving a vehicle unaccompanied by a qualified person will increase from  $\in$ 80 to  $\in$ 160. The fine for novice and learner drivers not displaying 'L' or 'N' plates, or tabards in the case of motorcyclists, will double to  $\in$ 120.

There were numerous information leaflets and resources on Mental Health and wellbeing available at the launch.





The committee is made up of community and statutory agencies, who recognise and value the importance of people minding their mental health. In addition, both the North and South Tipperary Mental Health Week groups will have specific actions taking place in their respective regions. One of the main events that took place over the week was a talk on Mental Health by John Longeran who was Governor of Mountjoy Prison for over 22 years and author of two books. This talk was most enjoyable and it was a talk that everyone that attended took away something from the talk. John spoke about mental health and life in general and talked about the stigma and shame that is still associated with Mental and Wellbeing, he said no one should suffer in silence and no one should suffer alone. He stated that every human being is one step away from being vulnerable and that life's journey brings you everywhere, he also stressed that people need to stop talking negativity to themselves and that very day is a new beginning.



### **LEO Women's Enterprise Day**









Dr Karol Mullaney lectures in history in University of Limerick. Her interests include cultural and social history, country houses, landed elites and public history. She was involved in the travelling exhibition on W.D. Hemphill and her publications include W.D. Hemphill: Irish Victorian photographer.

MARCH 21<sup>ST</sup> DR JOHN BORGONOVO

Cumann na mBan (the)

Born in San Francisco, Dr Borgonovo completed his MA in UCC in 1997 and returned there as lecturer in 2010. He is best known for his work on the Irish revolutionary period 1916-1923. He was associate editor of the acclaimed *Atlas of the Irish Revolution* and also worked on the RTE documentary on the subject. He has produced several other publications and also lectures widely to groups and local societies.











#### Key messages

- Small amounts of treats and a few times a week is okay, but it's important to decide as a family when to have treats and stick to it.
- Talk to your wider circle about your plan to reduce treats to get them on board.
- Avoid buying treats when you're doing the weekly shop. If you bring your children shopping, agree before you go in if a treat will be bought and what type of treat can be bought.
- Keep treats out of sight at home. Put them in a high press or cupboard so little hands can't reach them.
